#### Subject: Mayors' City Selection Committee Request to Alter LAFCO Membership

The Commission will continue discussion on a request from the Mayors' City Selection Committee of Shasta County to change the number of Regular City Members seated on the Commission from two to three with one Alternate City Member.

# BACKGROUND

The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 (CKH Act) is the principal act that governs LAFCOs throughout the state. It defines the powers, composition, and processes for LAFCO. Specifically, Government Code (G.C.) Section 56325 specifies the general composition of LAFCO as follows:

- Two (2) Commission members appointed by the Board of Supervisors from their own membership and one (1) alternate.
- Two (2) Commission members appointed by the cities in the county, each of whom shall be a mayor or council member, appointed by the City Selection Committee, and one (1) alternate.
- Two (2) Commission members who are presiding officers or members of legislative bodies of independent special districts, appointed by the independent special district selection committee pursuant to G.C. Section 56332, and one (1) alternate.
- One (1) Commission member representing the general public appointed by the other members of the Commission, and one (1) alternate.

This composition provides for a seven (7) member commission with equal representation from county, city, and special district members, and with public member representation. It also provides for one (1) alternate for each category so that in the event a regular member cannot attend, a voting member representing that category may still participate in the meeting. The term of office of each member shall be four years (G.C. Section 56334).

There are five exceptions to the composition as defined in CKH Act which were enacted by special legislation. These exceptions are for each of the counties listed below:

G.C. Section 56326 - Los Angeles County

Two (2) county members, one (1) resident of the San Fernando Valley Statistical Area, two (2) appointed by the city selection committee, one (1) appointed city member from a legislative body having a population in excess of 30 percent of the total population of the county, two (2) special district members, and one (1) public member, for a total of nine (9) commission members.

- G.C. Section 56326.5 Sacramento County Two (2) county members, one (1) City of Sacramento member, one (1) regular city member, two (2) special district members, and one (1) public member, <u>for a total of seven (7) commission</u> <u>members</u>.
- G.C. Section 56327 Santa Clara County Two (2) county members, one (1) city member from the city with the largest population, one (1) regular city member, and one (1) public member who is not a resident of cities already represented on the commission, <u>for a total of five (5) commission members</u>.
- G.C. Section 56328 San Diego County Two (2) county members, two (2) regular city members, one (1) city member from the city with the largest population, two (2) special district members, and one (1) public member, <u>for a total</u> <u>of eight (8) commission members.</u>
- G.C. Section 56328.5 Kern County Two (2) county members, two (2) regular city members, one (1) city member from the city with the largest population, two (2) special district members, and (2) public members, for a total of <u>nine (9) commission members</u>.

There are also provisions in the CKH Act for counties that do not have cities such as Trinity County, and those that do not have special district representation. To alter the composition of a specific LAFCO, special legislation would need to be passed by the state legislature and approved by the governor to amend the CKH Act.

# DISCUSSION

At the April 19, 2024, Shasta County Mayors' City Selection Committee Special Meeting, the attending members made the following recommendation (Attachment B):

"By motion made, seconded (Neutze/Powell), and unanimously carried, the Mayors' City Selection Committee recommended changing the city membership of the Shasta County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) from two members and one alternate to three members, to reflect the three incorporated cities within Shasta County and to provide permanent representation on the LAFCO board for all three cities."

As stated above, in order to change the composition for Shasta County, special legislation for a statutory change to the CKH Act would be required. In order to introduce a bill for this change, a representative of the state assembly or senate would need to sponsor a bill and introduce it as part of the new legislative cycle. These cycles typically occur over two years and require authorship of the bill, lobbying to garner support, and continued coordination of legislative staff as the bill moves through both the assembly and senate prior to being presented to the governor for signature.

It should be noted that the majority of exceptions for LAFCO compositions are based on population size. For instance, the San Fernando Valley had an estimated 2022 population of 1.86 million and Los Angeles County has a total population of 9.7 million. Additionally, the largest city in Kern County is Bakersfield which had an estimated 2022 population of 410,647. By comparison, Redding had an estimated 2022 population of 92,906.

Pursuant to G.C. Section 56325 (b), the City Selection Committee is "encouraged to appoint members to fairly represent the diversity of the cities in the county, with respect to population and geography." The current rules and regulations for the Shasta County Mayors' City Selection Committee (below) specify an annual appointment for members as opposed to the four year term specified in G.C. Section 56334.

#### Rules and Regulations of the Mayors' City Selection Committee - Rule V: Section 4

Two elected city representatives, and an elected alternate city member, shall be appointed to the Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) based on those nominations submitted by the Mayors of each city as provided herein.

If the office of a regular city member becomes vacant, the alternate member may serve and vote in place of the former regular city member until the appointment of a new regular city member is made to fill the vacancy. If a member who is a city officer ceases to be an elected officer of a city during his or her term, his or her membership on the LAFCO shall be considered vacant.

Commission member rotation shall be as follows:

<u>Rotation</u>	<u>Representatives</u>	<u>Alternate</u>
Rotation 1	Anderson and Shasta Lake	Redding
Rotation 2	Shasta Lake and Redding	Anderson
Rotation 3	Redding and Anderson	Shasta Lake

Effective January 2017 rotating annually as stated above.

It should also be noted that the CKH Act contains a provision that specifies the role of Commissioners when seated on LAFCO. G.C. Section 56331.4 states that "while in service on the commission, all commission members shall exercise their independent judgement on behalf of the interests of residents, property owners, and the public as a whole in furthering the purposes of [LAFCO]. Any member appointed on behalf of local governments shall represent the interests of the public as a whole and not solely the interests of the appointing authority. This section does not require the abstention of any member on any matter, nor does it create a right of action in any person". As such, when city members are appointed to the Commission, they are not representing their individual city interests of the sole interests of the Mayors' City Selection Committee but rather the public as a whole throughout Shasta County.

At the previous LAFCO meeting on June 6<sup>th</sup>, 2024, the Commission discussed the request including potential options for balancing the Commission by including another special district or public member in addition to an extra city member. The cost of introducing special legislation was also discussed. The cost is largely unknown and could vary greatly depending on the level of coordination and involvement of staff.

Since there was limited attendance at the prior Commission meeting, this item was continued for further discussion and potential action.

## RECOMMENDATION

The Commission is invited to hold discussion on the composition of Shasta LAFCO and provide direction to staff.

#### Subject: LAFCO Office Lease Renewal and Future Closure

The Commission will consider renewing the lease for the current LAFCO office space and discuss options for closing the office in the future.

# BACKGROUND

LAFCO currently maintains an office at 999 Mission De Oro Drive in the City of Redding. This small two room office houses the historical LAFCO files and miscellaneous office furniture and equipment. Since the departure of the former Office Manager, the space is largely unused.

Shasta LAFCO maintains the following policy in regard to office space:

# Section 3. Provisions for Quarters, Equipment and Supplies - 3.1: Provisions for Quarters

It shall be the policy of Shasta LAFCO to establish and maintain an administrative office that is separate and independent from any other local governmental agency or private enterprise. Provisions for lease or rental of an appropriate administrative office shall be made in the annual operating budget. The Executive Officer or General Counsel are authorized to negotiate the terms of any lease or rental agreement for subsequent approval by the Commission. The Executive Officer shall also be responsible for on-going compliance with the terms and conditions of any lease agreement approved by the Commission.

## DISCUSSION

The current lease for the LAFCO office ends on July 31, 2024. The Executive Officer contacted the building owner to discuss options for a month to month or 6-month lease. The building owner indicated that spaces are only available for one-year leases and LAFCO will need to sign a new lease (Attachment A) in order to keep utilizing the space. Based on this information and current LAFCO policy, it is recommended that LAFCO maintain the office until July 2025.

During the upcoming year, staff proposes the following to prepare for office closure next summer:

- Inventory assets: Staff will create a full inventory of assets that are currently located at the Redding office.
- Assess options for digitizing files: Staff will research options for digitizing all historical files so ٠ they can be easily accessed for research purposes.

- <u>Assess storage options</u>: Staff will research options for storage of historical files and any assets the Commission may wish to keep. The County currently uses North Court Storage which offers monthly storage rates of \$90 and up depending on the size of the unit.
- <u>Assess Policy</u>: Staff will review the policy of other LAFCOs, and provide potential options to the Commission for amending the current Shasta LAFCO policy. If amended, staff can proceed with the following steps.
  - <u>Dispose of surplus property</u>: Any office furniture, equipment or material that is no longer needed and that the Commission deems is surplus property will need to be disposed of or donated. During prior office relocations, unused furniture and equipment was offered as a donation to special districts.
  - <u>Prepare files for storage</u>: Staff will organize historical LAFCO files into storage boxes that will be easier to move and store. These will be labeled with sufficient detail to allow for easy access of documents in the future.
  - <u>Move</u>: Once office furniture and equipment has been disposed of per Commission direction, staff will move any remaining items, including the historical files, to a storage facility. The office will then be cleaned, and keys returned to the building owner.

# RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Commission approve the new one year lease for the current office space at 999 Mission de Oro Drive and provide direction to staff as needed on potential policy amendment and future office closure.

# COMMERCIAL LEASE AGREEMENT

Date: July 18, 2024

# I. <u>PARTIES</u>

Debra L. Randell, hereinafter "Landlord", and Shasta LAFCo, hereinafter "Tenant", hereby enter into this Commercial Lease Agreement, hereinafter "Agreement", on the above date.

# II. LEASE PREMISES

Landlord is the owner of the land and improvements at 999 Mission De Oro Drive, Redding, CA 96003 (the "Property").

# III. LEASE

Landlord leases the Leased Premises (Suite 106) to the Tenant and Tenant leases the Leased Premises from Landlord on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

# IV. LEASE TERM

The "Initial Term" of the Lease Agreement begins on August 1, 2024, for the period of one year, with the option to renew for one year. If the Landlord does not provide possession of the Leased Premises timely at the start of the Initial Term, lease hereinafter described shall be prorated until such time as Tenant takes possession.

# V. LEASE AMOUNT

Tenant shall pay to the Landlord the sum of \$600.00 per month. Each payment shall be due on the 1st of the month payable to Landlord at 999 Mission De Oro Drive, Redding, CA 96003. Any rents received after the 5<sup>th</sup> of the month will result in a \$50 late fee.

# VI. ASSIGNMENT

Tenant shall not sublease all or any part of the Leased Premises without Landlord's written consent, save and except any assignment to any successor corporation to Tenant including any purchases of all or substantially all of the Tenant's assets.

# VII. <u>REPAIRS</u>

Tenant shall make, at Tenant's expense, all necessary repairs for damage caused by Tenant including normal wear and tear except for repairs and obligations as otherwise set forth herein.

# VIII. ALTERATIONS

Tenant, at Tenant's expense, shall have the right to remodel, redecorate, and make additions, improvements, and replacements of and to all or any part of the Leased Premises, upon receipt of Landlord's written consent, provide the same are made in a workmanlike manner and utilizing good quality materials. An additional alarm system may be installed in the Leased Premises.

# IX. TAXES ON RENTED PREMISES

Landlord shall pay, prior to delinquency, all general real estate taxes assessed on the Leased Premises.

# X. <u>INSURANCE</u>

Tenant and Landlord shall, each at its own expense, maintain a policy or policies of comprehensive general liability insurance fully paid and without lapse. Such insurance shall afford minimum protections of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit coverage of bodily injury, property damage, or combination thereof. Landlord shall be listed as an additional insured on Tenant's policy or policies or comprehensive general liability insurance. Tenant shall provide Landlord with current Certificates of Insurance evidencing Tenant's compliance.

# XI. <u>UTILITIES</u>

Landlord shall pay all charges for utilities with the exclusion of telephone and DSL charges. Tenant shall incur the charges for those services.

# XII. <u>SIGNS</u>

Tenant shall have the right to put logo on sign facing Browning and Hilltop Dr. on allocated spot agreed on by tenant and landlord.

# XIII. <u>RIGHT OF ENTRY</u>

Landlord shall have the right to enter upon the Leased Premises at reasonable hours to inspect the same, provided Landlord shall not thereby unreasonably interfere with Tenant's business.

# XIV. PARKING

Tenant, Tenant's employees, guests, and invitees, shall have the non-exclusive use in common with Landlord, other tenants of the Property, their guests, and invitees of the non-reserved common automobile parking areas, driveways, and footways subject to rules and regulations for the use thereof as prescribed from time to time by the Landlord.

# XV. DAMAGE TO PREMISES

If the Leased Premises or any part thereof is so damaged by fire, casualty, or structural defects that the Leased Premises cannot be used for Tenant's lawful purposes, then Tenant shall have the right to terminate this agreement as of the date of such damage. Such termination must be conveyed to Landlord, in writing, and will be effective ninety (30) days after receipt of such notice by Landlord. During said thirty-day period, Landlord shall have the right, but not the obligation, to attempt to return the Leased Premises to a useful condition. Tenant shall be relieved from paying rent and other charges during any portion of the Leased Term that the Leased Premises are inoperable or unfit for occupancy or use, in whole or in part, for the Tenant's purposes. Leases and other charges paid in advance for any such periods shall be credited on the next ensuing payment, if any, but if no further payments are made, any such advance payment shall be refunded to Tenant.

# XVI. <u>DEFAULT</u>

Any default made by Tenant in the payment of rent when due which continues for fifteen (15) days after written notice thereof shall have been given to Tenant without correction thereof, Landlord may declare the term of this Agreement ended and terminated by giving Tenant written notice. Possession of the Leased Premises shall be immediately surrendered to Landlord.

# XVII. WARRANTY OF QUIET POSSESION

Landlord covenants and warrants that Landlord will keep and maintain Tenant in exclusive, quiet, peaceable, and undisturbed, uninterrupted possession of the Leased Premises so long as Tenant meets its obligations under this Agreement during the term of this Agreement.

# XVIII. SECURITY

A Security Deposit in the amount of \$600 shall be held by Landlord without liability for interest and as security for the performance by Tenant's covenants obligations under this Agreement.

# XIX. NOTICE

Any notice required or permitted under this Agreement shall be deemed sufficiently given or served if sent by United States certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed as follows:

#### Subject: FY2023-24 Budget Amendment

The Commission will receive an update on the FY2023-24 budget and consider an amendment to cover staffing services costs for June 2024.

# BACKGROUND

Shasta LAFCO adopted the FY2023-24 Budget on June 1, 2023 which was then distributed to member organizations with County Auditor apportioned annual contributions invoices. Two budget amendments were approved by the Commission in August and December 2023, respectively. Amendment 1 was approved primarily to reallocate planned payroll expenses to staffing services after the departure of the former Officer Manager. Amendment 2 was approved to reallocate additional payroll, employer taxes, office supplies, and MSR funds to cover staffing, communication, audit, website, and membership costs.

# DISCUSSION

Due to the departure of the former Office Manager and the transition of Executive Officers, additional staffing services have been required to review current contract agreements, coordinate with project applicants, review and organize administrative files, and reconcile financial accounting records. As such, the total cost for staffing services has exceeded the budgeted amount. To cover these expenditures, the following fund reallocations are proposed:

- Decrease Communications IT Support by \$1,000 •
- Decrease Info Tech Services by \$2,500 ٠
- Decrease Info Tech Website by \$500 •
- Increase MSR/SOI Expenses by \$600 •
- Increase Contract Independent Executive Officer & Staff Services by \$3,400

The Executive Committee reviewed the proposed budget amendment at their July 15th meeting and recommended approval.

# RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Commission review the proposed reallocations and adopt Resolution 2024-03 approving the budget amendment as recommended by the Executive Committee.

#### **Status of MSR/SOI Updates** Subject:

The Commission will receive an update on the FY2024-25 MSR/SOI workplan, including the regional fire services MSR/SOI Update for the intermountain region of northeastern Shasta County, the MSR/SOI Update for the City of Anderson, and the MSR/SOI Update for CSA #1.

# BACKGROUND

The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act directs Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCOs) to regularly prepare municipal service reviews (MSRs) in conjunction with establishing and updating each local agency's sphere of influence (SOI). The legislative intent of MSRs is to proactively assess the availability, capacity, and efficiency of local governmental services. MSRs may also lead LAFCOs to take other actions under their authority, such as forming, consolidating, or dissolving one or more local agencies in addition to any related sphere changes.

## DISCUSSION

# Intermountain Regional Fire Services MSR/SOI Update

The Intermountain MSR/SOI will then be limited to Fall River Vally FPD and Burney FPD. Staff has begun coordination with the Districts and requested initial information from each regarding services, equipment, staffing, finances, and other matters related to operation of the Districts. Staff has set up the document templates for each agency profile and will begin drafting sections as information is received. Fall River Valley FPD has indicated that their ISO rating will be updated this fall and would like the information to be included in the MSR/SOI Update.

# City of Anderson MSR/SOI Update

Staff received ample information from the City on provided services, governance, and finances. Staff has prepared an administrative draft of the background and services sections of the document and will be completing the finances section by the end of July. The City will be provided a full administrative draft for review and comment prior to public review of the document. Adoption is planned for October 2024.

# CSA #1 - County Fire

Based on public comments received over the last several months and additional input provided by commissioners, staff will be moving forward with an MSR/SOI Update for the entirety of CSA #1 -County Fire. Staff has submitted an initial information request to the Fire Chief and is beginning to draft document sections as information becomes available.

The Executive Officer has received several phone calls from members of the public expressing concerns about the existing CSA #1 contract with CAL FIRE, the increasing costs to provide fire services in the unincorporated part of Shasta County (Schedule A), and declining volunteers.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Commission review the status of the upcoming MSR/SOI Updates and provide direction to staff as needed.

#### Subject: **Current Status of Current and Future Applications**

The Commission will receive an update on the current status of applications and provide direction to staff as necessary.

# BACKGROUND

LAFCOs are responsible, under the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, to regulate the formation and development of local governmental agencies and their municipal services. This includes approving or disapproving proposed changes of organization, such as boundary changes (e.g. annexations), consistent with adopted policies and procedures pursuant to California Government Code (G.C.) §56375. LAFCOs have broad discretion in amending and conditioning changes of organization as long as they do not directly regulate land use, property development, or subdivision requirements.

# DISCUSSION

The following application(s) are active with LAFCo:

Proposed SOI Amendment and Annexation to CSA #8 (Palo Cedro): The proposal includes two parcels (APNs: 059-390-003 & 059-390-002) along Deschutes Road totaling approximately 5.4 acres. Both parcels are outside the existing CSA #8 SOI but adjacent to the northwesterly jurisdictional boundary. Surrounding land uses include rural residential, commercial, and planned development. Currently, the southern parcel has a single residential structure, and the northern parcel has one larger residential and multiple smaller structures. The applicants are requesting annexation to CSA #8 in order to obtain wastewater services for their properties. Water services are currently provided by Bella Vista Water District and no change of provider is proposed as this time.

The EO prepared a letter of incomplete application outlining the additional documentation needed to proceed with processing the application. The applicant has provided what additional information is available. However, since the County will need to complete their discretionary process first, it could take several months to a year depending on required CEQA documentation. Until the additional items are received, the application will remain on hold.

Proposed Out of Agency Service Extension to Wooded Acres Subdivision (City of Anderson): This application was conditionally approved in February 2023 by Resolution 2023-01. Condition 11 stated, "Completion of proceedings shall be concluded within one year after adoption of this resolution. If the proceedings are not concluded within one year after passage of this resolution, all proceedings shall be terminated unless an extension is approved." Since that time, the City has indicated that they no longer wish to extend water services to the area and no request for an extension of the time limit was received. The Executive Officer will be bringing forward a resolution of termination of proceedings at the next regular LAFCO meeting.

• <u>Shasta Fire Protection District Formation</u>: The Shasta FPD formation was approved in October 2022 by Resolution No. 22-14. At the same time, divestiture of fire services from Shasta Community Services District was approved by Resolution 22-08. Since then, the Shasta FPD has been working on conditions compliance. The FPD only has two conditions left to meet which include completing an asset transfer between the CSD and FPD, and providing LAFCO with a map and legal boundary description that meets Board of Equalization Guidelines. FPD representatives have provided LAFCO with a draft map that is to be finalized in the upcoming weeks and a signed asset transfer agreement between Shasta CSD and Shasta FPD.

The following pre-applications are being tracked by LAFCo:

• <u>City of Redding Annexation</u>: Property owners are proposing to annex approximately 90 acres of land within the City of Redding's primary growth area along Collyer Drive and Old Oregon Trail. The property is also located within the Bella Vista Water District boundary. The proposed annexation would allow for development that is estimated to create up to 300 dwelling units including single family housing, senior apartments, and multi-family/ mixed use development. There is also the potential for retail/ office space or additional multi-family development along Old Oregon Trail.

#### RECOMMENDATION

**Summary:** The State Water Resources Control Board and the 9 California regional water quality control boards regulate water quality in accordance with the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act and the federal Clean Water Act. Current law authorizes a regional board to order the provision of sewer service by a receiving sewer system, as defined, to a disadvantaged community served by an inadequate onsite sewage treatment system, as defined. This bill would authorize the state board, until January 1, 2029, and after it makes a specified finding or findings by resolution, to require a designated sewer system to contract with an administrator designated or approved by the state board for administrative, technical, operational, legal, or managerial services to assist a designated sewer system with the delivery of adequate sewer service, as defined.

**Summary:** The Ralph M. Brown Act, requires, with specified exceptions, each legislative body of a local agency to provide notice of the time and place for its regular meetings and an agenda containing a brief general description of each item of business to be transacted. Current law authorizes the legislative body of a local agency to use alternate teleconferencing provisions during a proclaimed state of emergency (emergency provisions) and, until January 1, 2026, in certain circumstances related to the particular member if at least a quorum of its members participate from

a singular physical location that is open to the public and situated within the agency's jurisdiction and other requirements are met (nonemergency provisions). Current law imposes different requirements for notice, agenda, and public participation, as prescribed, when a legislative body is using alternate teleconferencing provisions. The nonemergency provisions impose restrictions on remote participation by a member of the legislative body and require the legislative body to provide specific means by which the public may remotely hear and visually observe the meeting. This bill, until January 1, 2026, would authorize a subsidiary body, as defined, to use similar alternative teleconferencing provisions and would impose requirements for notice, agenda, and public participation, as prescribed. The bill would require at least one staff member of the local agency to be present at a designated primary physical meeting location during the meeting. The bill would require the local agency to post the agenda at the primary physical meeting location. The bill would require the members of the subsidiary body to visibly appear on camera during the open portion of a meeting that is publicly accessible via the internet or other online platform, as specified. The bill would also require the subsidiary body to list a member of the subsidiary body who participates in a teleconference meeting from a remote location in the minutes of the meeting. In order to use teleconferencing pursuant to this act, the bill would require the legislative body that established the subsidiary body by charter, ordinance, resolution, or other formal action to make specified findings by majority vote, before the subsidiary body uses teleconferencing for the first time and every 12 months thereafter.

Brown Act generally requires for teleconferencing that the legislative body of a local agency that elects to use teleconferencing post agendas at all teleconference locations, identify each teleconference location in the notice and agenda of the meeting or proceeding, and have each teleconference location be accessible to the public. Current law also requires that, during the teleconference, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body participate from locations within the boundaries of the territory over which the local agency exercises jurisdiction. The act provides an exemption to the jurisdictional requirement for health authorities, as defined. Current law, until January 1, 2026, authorizes the legislative body of a local agency to use alternative teleconferencing in specified circumstances if, during the teleconference meeting, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body participates in person from a singular physical location clearly identified on the agenda that is open to the public and situated within the boundaries of the territory over which the local agency exercises jurisdiction, and the legislative body complies with prescribed requirements. Current law imposes prescribed restrictions on remote participation by a member under these alternative teleconferencing provisions, including establishing limits on the number of meetings a member may participate in solely by teleconference from a remote location, prohibiting such participation for a period of more than 3 consecutive months or 20% of the regular meetings for the local agency within a calendar year, or more than 2 meetings if the legislative body regularly meets fewer than 10 times per calendar year. This bill would revise those limits, instead prohibiting such participation for more than a specified number of meetings per year, based on how frequently the legislative body regularly meets.

Summary: The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 provides the exclusive authority and procedure for the initiation, conduct, and completion of changes of organization and reorganization for cities and districts, except as specified. The act continues in existence in each county a local agency formation commission (LAFCO) that consists of members appointed, as specified, and that oversees those changes of organization and reorganization. The act authorizes a LAFCO to, among other things, review and approve with or without amendment, wholly, partially, or conditionally, or disapprove proposals for changes of organization or reorganization, including incorporation of a city or formation of a district, as specified. Current law requires each county to have a board of supervisors and provides for the organization and powers of the board of supervisors. This bill would require the County of Los Angeles, no later than March 1, 2025, to submit to the Legislature a report that includes specified information, including, among other things, for East Los Angeles, the feasibility of forming a municipal advisory council, a local town council, or a coordinating council that could represent the comprehensive interests of the entire East Los Angeles community. If the county has produced a report that contains substantially similar information to the information required by the above-described provisions, this bill would authorize the county to submit that report in lieu of completing a separate report.
